





Joint Workshop: ERC GlobalDivercities Project and CUNY Graduate Center

New Perspectives on Public Space: Emotion, Infrastructure and Mobility

The intention of the workshop is to invite the GlobalDivercities postdoctoral researchers to think about their sites substantively and to reflect on new perspectives by way of discussing their preliminary findings; conversely, doctoral students from the Graduate Center will add different contexts and theoretical formulations to the discussion. The morning and early afternoon of the first will be organized as three panels made up of three people-- two post docs from different GlobalDivercities sites and one of the public space working group students. Each panel will have 1 and ½ hours to present 20 minute papers on the topic followed by a discussion by one of the participating guest faculty. At the conclusion of the panels the NYC team will take us on a brief visit to the GlobalDivercities poroject fieldsite. On the second day, we will reverse the process and have the faculty present their current research with a focus on methodology and alternative theoretical frameworks. There would be only one session with faculty papers and all student discussants.
